## **Educator Reflection**

- What is your immediate reaction to the students ideas (mind, body, spiti)?
- What is this student asking us to do?
- What is this student asking us to stop?
- Where is this student calling us to stretch?
- How can we incorporate this student's reflections into a classroom...TOMORROW?

Whole Class Task Directions:	
1	Bring students together to share your hopes that the classroom can be a great place for all.
2	Let students know you need their advice and input.
3	Ask students to develop an individual list of 5-10 things that can make a classroom boring vs. 5 things that can make a classroom fun.
4	Review the student responses with a few colleagues.
5	Categorize them by student response (Be verbatim, do not interpret).
6	<b>Identify 2-3 categories you want to take on in your lesson design. Choose 1-2 changes you can make right away</b> (Ex. dance party button or show and tell). Identify 1-2 that will require help from students.
7	<b>Bring your reflections to your students - Be honest about how you made your choice and let students know what you will do with the rest</b> (Ex. I would like to begin with these three to practice them. Over the year, I will keep adding in more).
8	<b>Do a design session with your students based on 1-2 inquiry questions from your chose categories</b> (Ex. How do we create more time to talk with each other in our day?). Brainstorm together. Build on their ideas. If you need a scaffold, identify a high leverage block of time like math. Actually break it down into its parts and find ways to add in talk time.
9	Try it out.
(10)	<b>Get student feedback on what you tried</b> (Ex. What worked for our class? What did not?). Implement the feedback and try it again.
